- Tribal members and descendants who are interested in Nmé (Lake Sturgeon) and their connection to other culturally important natural resources (such as manoomin)
- Women, non-binary, and two-spirit people are especially encouraged to participate
- Little River Odawa tribal members who want to talk about their knowledge of the land/waters, nmé, and natural/cultural resources that have been impacted by climate change and what ideas they have for sovereignty and self-determination in a community-based conversation with other tribal members and descendants.
- Focus groups will be held either virtually or in-person with masks and social distancing.
